The Dickinson Independent School District Board of Trustees met on Wednesday, February 12, 2025 for a regular Board Action meeting. This is a recap of the highlights from the meeting.

Board of Trustees approves five administrative hires

The Board of Trustees approved:

- A waiver for a missed school day at K.E. Little Elementary on January 24, 2025.
- A 2025-2026 Texas Education Agency Waiver for staff development minutes.
- A waiver for the 75,600-minute calendar requirement for Collegiate High School for the 2024-2025 school year.
- Three-year waivers with the Texas Education Agency for modified schedules on State Assessment Testing Days, foreign exchange students, and the Teacher Data Portal of the Texas Assessment Management System.
- Action items including the Order of Election for the May 3 School Board Trustee Election and consent agenda items.

Presentations:

- Dr. Debby Noffsinger, Director of Assessment, Accountability and Compliance, presented the 2023-2024 Texas Academic Performance Report during a TAPR Public Hearing.
- Captain Fillmore with the Galveston County Sheriff's Department was introduced as the new captain over the Dickinson ISD School Liaison Officer Program.

Dickinson High School College Academic Honor

Dickinson ISD is delighted to announce the outstanding academic achievements of five remarkable students who have demonstrated exceptional dedication and talent in their respective fields and in turn been rewarded with impressive honors to continue their educations at top universities this fall.

Bradley Marshell has been admitted to the prestigious Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University, where he will receive an impressive scholarship of \$30,900 per year to pursue his studies.

Bethany Lloyd has been awarded a full-tuition scholarship to Columbia University, recognizing her hard work and academic excellence. Additionally, she has earned the prestigious distinction of being a Gates Scholar semifinalist and has been named a Jack Kent Cooke College Scholarship semifinalist.

Angel Hernandez has been named a Gates Scholar semifinalist and a QuestBridge Scholar, earning a full-tuition scholarship to Notre Dame University, valued at \$89,700 per year, to further his academic journey.

Pepper Brown has earned the highly competitive NROTC scholarship, valued at over \$280,000. This scholarship will allow her to complete her Baccalaureate degree in a traditional college setting, where she will prepare to commission as an Officer in the U.S. Navy or U.S. Marine Corps. She also earned a \$60,000 scholarship from Louisiana State University.

Jaila Oatis has earned a \$50,000 academic merit scholarship from Baylor University where she will pursue her degree in Pre-Medical Studies.
