SIXTH GRADE

Fourth Nine Weeks

READING LANGUAGE ARTS

This grading period, students strengthen key reading and writing skills. They will practice writing clear responses, using text evidence, and improving sentence clarity. Students will read engaging texts and explore themes that will guide a short research project.

Students will:

- Write clear responses that include a claim and evidence.
- Organize ideas with strong reasons and explanations.
- Revise sentences to make writing smoother and more precise.
- Identify an author's claim, evidence, and perspective.
- Read new texts, identify themes, and use those themes to explore research topics.

MATH

MODULE 5

Describing Variability of Quantities, Continued

- Students will learn more about the field of statistics (the study of data) and learn to ask questions that have more than one answer (variability).
- Students will follow the statistical process as they ask a questions, collect data, organize data and interpret what it means.
- Students will work with crucial data points such as mean (the average) and median (middle number when lined up in order).
- Students will describe variability/how spread out the numbers are and display data with Dot Plots, Histograms, and Box Plots.

SCIENCE

- Explore how plants, animals, and other living things depend on each other and on non-living things like sunlight, water, temperature, and soil to survive.
- Talk about different relationships between living things, like when animals hunt others (predators), compete for resources, or live closely together in helpful or harmful ways (like mutualism, parasitism, and commensalism).
- Understand how individual organisms make up populations, and populations make up communities within an ecosystem.
- Learn about the history of cell theory and how all living things are made of one or more cells, which come from other cells and are the building blocks of life.
- Discuss how differences within a group of living things can help or hurt their chances of surviving when the environment changes.

SOCIAL STUDIES

- Describe how the history and governments of Sub-Saharan Africa shape its diverse cultures.
- Explain how economic activities and resources affect daily life in South Asia.
- Describe how geography influences culture, trade, and lifestyles in East and Southeast Asia.
- Explain why China's water scarcity affects people, farming, and industries.
- Describe how Australia and Oceania's unique environments influence their cultures and economies.
- Explain how people adapt to their environment and manage natural resources.

LOOKING AHEAD

Preparing for Seventh Grade

Seventh grade increases academic rigor and social responsibilities. Support your soon-to-be 7th grader by:

Reviewing study habits. Deeper content and more frequent assessments—practice reviewing notes, organizing materials, and studying in small chunks.

Strengthening writing skills. Encourage journaling, reading, or explaining ideas out loud to build clarity and confidence.

Encouraging logical reasoning. Ask them to justify their opinions or compare viewpoints—critical thinking becomes more important.

Supporting emotional balance. Hormonal and social changes can feel intense; teach strategies for managing stress and communicating respectfully.

Character Strong:

- Cooperation (March)
- Courage (April)
- Creativity (May)

Cooperation means working together to reach a common goal, even when tasks feel challenging or opinions differ. Students learn how to listen, share ideas, and respect others' strengths.
