Second Nine Weeks Honors/STEAM

READING LANGUAGE ARTS

Eighth-grade Honors students focus on informational texts, satire and irony, and advanced essay writing.

- Discuss a funny news story, meme, or TV moment and ask, "Is there a bigger point behind the joke?"
- Point out strong or unusual word choices in ads, music, or headlines and talk about why they stand out.
- Encourage your student to read their own writing aloud to check that every sentence is clear and complete.
- Ask about upcoming essays or projects and celebrate effort and growth, not just grades.

MATH

Unit 4: Write Linear Equations, continued

- Learn how to write the equation of a line from a graph, two points, or slope and y-intercept.
- Practice changing equations between different forms.
- Apply these skills to solve real-world problems.

Unit 5: Systems

- Learn how to find where two lines cross using graphing, substitution, or elimination.
- Apply these methods to solve real-world problems with multiple conditions.

Unit 6: Graph Exponential Functions

- Learn how to identify and graph exponential growth and decay on a coordinate plane.
- Explore key features like asymptotes and rates of change.
- Understand what the graphs mean in real-world situations.

Unit 7: Write Exponential Functions

- Learn how to write equations for exponential growth and decay using patterns, tables, or descriptions.
- Explore how the starting value and growth/decay rate affect the function.
- Apply these skills to solve real-world problems.

SCIENCE

- Build simple circuits to see how electricity flows, like in home wiring or car lights.
- Make a device that creates electricity using magnets and electric charges.
- Explore how heat moves through solids, liquids, and gases by feeling, observing, or using examples like cooking or weather.
- Investigate how energy or signals travel through different materials, like how Wi-Fi works.
- Talk about how waves can bounce, overlap, or bend and how this is used in technology like phones or medical machines.
- Discuss how tiny particles called electrons release light when they change energy levels, helping explain things like colors and light.
 8th Grade STEAM- Follows Integrated Physics and Chemistry (IPC) Curriculum.

SOCIAL STUDIES

During this grading period, students are studying the Constitution and Government and the challenges and successes of the Early Republic. Students will learn:

- Compromises at the Constitutional Convention.
- Weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation.
- Key ideas in the Constitution and Bill of Rights.
- What Federalists and Anti-Federalists debated.
- How early presidents shaped our government.
- Domestic issues of the new republic.
- Foreign issues of the new republic.
- Causes and Effects of the War of 1812.
- Early Supreme Court cases.

HOW CAN I HELP MY Exceptional Learner

Help Them Stay Organized

- Set up a quiet space with the tools they need pens, notebooks, folders, and a planner.
- Check in weekly (not daily!) to review assignments or upcoming projects.
- Teach them how to use a calendar or checklist to manage due dates and priorities.

Support Their Social-Emotional Growth

- Junior Highl brings big emotions. Be a safe place to talk about frustrations or friendships.
- Teach problem-solving and coping skills deep breathing, writing things down, or taking a break.
- Remind them that effort, not perfection, is the goal.

Build Real-World Skills Now

- Encourage responsibility: chores, managing time, turning in homework on time.
- Support soft skills like communication, teamwork, and perseverance.
- Help them see the connection between what they're learning and the real world.

Explore Careers Without the Pressure

- Watch videos, visit local workplaces, or invite friends/family to share what they do for a living.
- Show your child that there are many paths to success — college, trade schools, certifications, military service, entrepreneurship, etc.
